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Hep B United Awards \$60,000 to Community-Based Organizations for Hepatitis B Education and Screening

National Coalition Distributes Mini Grants to Fund Hepatitis B Education, Screening and Linkage to Care Activities Among Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders

DOYLESTOWN, PA (May 2014) – The Hepatitis B Foundation, a national nonprofit research and disease advocacy organization dedicated to finding a cure for hepatitis B, has awarded \$60,000 in mini grants to Hep B United coalition members. Hep B United is a national coalition established by the Foundation in partnership with the Association of Asian Pacific Community Health Organization to support local community-based coalitions across the country working to eliminate hepatitis B. Grant recipients will be working to address Hep B United’s strategic priorities of improving testing and linkage-to-care to prevent hepatitis B-related liver disease and liver cancer.

“We are very excited to support dedicated partners across the country who are working tirelessly to raise awareness about the importance of hepatitis B screening and encourage testing for those with the greatest risk,” said Kate Moraras, MPH, senior program director at the Hepatitis B Foundation and director of Hep B United. “The emphasis of this mini-grant program is focused on Asian American and Pacific Islander communities who make up 5 percent of the total population in the United States, but account for more than 50 percent of Americans living with chronic hepatitis B.
